JOIN THE **DISABILITY COMMISSION**

Do you have an interest in helping the City of Maryland Heights ensure an inclusive community for all? The Disability Commission currently has two vacancies that need to be filled by qualified members.

Formed in December 2022, the Disability Commission serves as an advisory team to City Council. Its purpose is to make recommendations for programmatic and legislative matters related to the quality of life, overall wellbeing, and inclusivity of residents and visitors living with disabilities.

Boards and commissions are an integral part of municipal government, offering an outlet for community members to get directly involved in the planning and operation of City activities. Appointments to these advisory bodies are made by the Mayor with the consent of the City Council.

Members must be living with a disability, the caregiver of someone living with a disability, and/or a representative of a business whose primary mission is the care and services of people living with disabilities. Each member of the Disability Commission serves a term length of three years.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT **SOLICITATIONS**

Have you ever wondered if the person knocking on your door to sell a service or a magazine is legal according to City regulations? Do you know your rights when it comes to solicitors? The City of Maryland Heights regulates the activities of solicitors to protect the privacy of residents and shield them from harassment. Maryland Heights issues solicitor licenses to those who apply and qualify based on regulations in the Municipal Code.

The following questions are frequently asked regarding this process:

Who is required to obtain a Solicitors License?

Any person who is knocking on your door, with the exception of individuals running for political office, require a Solicitors License. As soon as an individual knocks on your door and engages you personally, they are required to have a license. The regulations do not apply to those seeking to collect legitimate amounts

due, nor to any government agency or official in the pursuit of official duties. A license is not required to distribute a handbill, written advertisement, or other local publication provided the distributor does not knock on your door.

What is the application process?

Solicitors licenses are issued to each individual person going door to door. In other words, a company cannot get one license and send out many different solicitors. A license costs \$25.00 per solicitor for a 30 day period. The application requires a State Highway Patrol background check and a photo ID. Once a license is issued, a photo of the solicitor is added. This license and photo must be worn around their neck at all times and be visible upon request while they are soliciting.

What times can a solicitor knock on my door?

Solicitors are allowed to solicit at any time between 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. or

sunset (whichever occurs first). Solicitors may not approach any premises where "No Trespassing" or "No Soliciting Allowed" notices are posted.

What should you do if someone comes to your home?

Ask to see their solicitors license if it is not visible. If they do not have one, contact the Police Department at their non-emergency number, (314) 298-8700. Please remember to take note of any identifying characteristics and direction of travel to report to the Police Department. These regulations are put into place by the Mayor and City Council to protect you from unwelcomed solicitors in your neighborhood and to provide you with the knowledge that those that have obtained a license have met the qualifications outlined in the Municipal Code. GETTING TO KNOW YOUR LOCAL TAXES

After tax season, the City often receives inquiries and questions regarding taxes – whether it be property, utility, sales, or income tax. The City of Maryland Heights is NOT involved in the assessment, billing, or collection of property, income, or other state and federal taxes. However, here are a few answers to the common tax questions we receive:

If I own property in the City, how much of my taxes go to the City government?

Unlike several other cities (see graph below), Maryland Heights does not have a property tax. The City of Maryland Heights does not collect any property tax from residents or businesses for real estate or personal property.

If my property tax dollars don't support City provided services, what services do they fund?

On your property tax bill, every taxing jurisdiction is listed and includes special districts servicing the area such as schools, fire protection, sewer, community colleges, and libraries.


How are tax rates determined?

Although some limitations are defined by state statute, the local taxing districts set the tax rates. Generally, tax increases must be approved by voters within the district.

What is the sales tax rate and what services does it fund?

The City receives revenues from three different sales tax sources - a county-wide one percent tax on retail sales that is distributed by municipality population, a half-cent municipal tax on retail sales that can only be used to fund storm-water control and/or parks services, and a half-cent public safety sales tax. The State and St. Louis County levies sales taxes to fund a variety of services. Currently, our sales tax rate is 8.24% except in special tax districts.*

How is the Maryland Heights Parks/Storm-water Sales Tax distributed?

Since 2015, all of this revenue has been distributed to the Parks Fund to fund recreation projects including the Community Center, recreation programming, trail expansion, Fee Fee Ballfields, Aquaport improvements, and the Sustainability Campus. Storm-water projects are funded from the Capital Improvement Fund, which the Parks/Stormwater Sales Tax is also allocated to.

What is the City's largest revenue source?

Gaming tax is Maryland Height's largest revenue source. The City receives a tax of \$1 per casino admission and 2.1 percent of the net gaming receipts of casino operations at Hollywood Casino. The collection of taxes and disbursement to the City is administered by the State. Gaming tax revenues are deposited into the General Fund and Capital Improvement Fund where they cover expenditures including trash/recycling/yardwaste collection (free to residents), road improvement projects, and general operations.

POLICE-LED SUMMER CAMPS TEACH CHILDREN VALUABLE LESSONS

Kids can have a blast at summer camp while also acquiring important life skills at two police-led camps this summer. Both camps, instructed by the familiar face of DARE Officer Bob, offer a blend of fun and education.

SAFETY TOWN

The Safety Town program in Maryland Heights was established thirty-four years ago. While some aspects have evolved over the decades, such as the introduction of electronic kid-sized cars, the core curriculum remains focused on teaching essential safety awareness and preventative measures.

Lessons include the importance of signals and signs, as well as proper seatbelt use. Kids will be introduced to the Safety Town track and taught to stay on the "roadways," obeying signals and signs placed around the track. The dangers of home poisons lesson involves a show-and-tell with Officer Bob, displaying several examples of common household items that kids should not touch. Special guest visitors, such as the MHPD K-9 unit and the Fire District, will stop by to teach kids about using caution with animals and fire safety.

Along with other lessons on stranger



danger and pedestrian safety, one of the last things kids participate in is the lesson on bus safety – complete with a ride on a real school bus to a nearby park. For many pre-schoolers, this marks their first ride in a bus and helps prepare them for kindergarten and beyond. Safety Town concludes with a graduation ceremony where children showcase the lessons they've learned and receive their official certificates, alongside plenty of photo opportunities with Officer Bob.

"Safety Town is an incredible collaboration between the Police and Parks and Recreation Departments to bring safe, healthy play to our community's youngest members," states Officer Bob. "Children learn best when they are entertained and we use a unique mixture of guest speakers and hands-on lessons to drive home safety lessons that parents can continue at home. I love the enthusiasm of the young students and they come in each day eager to learn."

PLAY IT SAFE

Play it Safe, an offshoot of Safety Town, tailored for older children, was developed in response to feedback from kids. Also instructed by Officer Bob, the program revisits the Safety Town curriculum, reinforcing crucial safety lessons. One notable addition for the older group is a session on water safety held at Aquaport, providing children with a private swim practice before the park opens to the public.

"I've found with the Play it Safe kids, the important lessons taught from Safety Town are quickly recalled. Having this refresher course helps these valuable lessons become solidified," says Officer Bob.

The Maryland Heights Police
Department is proud of the long-running
success of these programs. "Both Safety
Town and Play it Safe offer peace of
mind to parents, knowing their children
are learning essential safety skills from a
trained police officer," said Public Relations
Officer McComas. "We provide a fun and
interactive way for kids to learn about safety.



The programs are designed to empower children to make smart decisions in real-life scenarios."

Opportunities are also available for high school counselors to assist Officer Bob with the classes. "The teenage counselors and myself quickly form bonds with these amazing young people," says Officer Bob. "Two weeks just fly by. It's a rewarding and fun way to spend my summer and if I'm lucky, I get to see the kiddos at my schools in the fall."

Throughout the year, the MHPD works with several departments to develop community relations. One of the main examples of this practice is Maryland




Heights Night Out, an annual tradition where police officers stop by block parties around town to interact with the residents.

This issue also reaches our youth population. One in three students experience poor mental health – one in ten students have attempted suicide.

HOW WE CAN HELP

As part of our City's mission to provide superior municipal services to our residents, we aim to address the wellbeing of our residents with the assistance of our Maryland Heights Social Services Coordinator Ericka Jones. Ericka helps provide our residents with a Mental Health resource packet of information on local counseling services, national crisis lines, inpatient mental health facilities, and more.

In addition to these resources, the National Alliance of Mental Health, NAMI St. Louis, is an organization of families, friends, and individuals whose lives have been affected by mental illness. Together, they advocate for better lives for individuals with mental illness.

On May 11, 2024, NAMI St. Louis will host a NAMIWalks fundraising event at Creve Coeur Lake. Their goal is to raise a total of \$230,000 towards NAMI's mission to provide education, advocacy, and support essential to the recovery, resilience, and wellbeing of all who have mental health needs. KEEP STREAMS CLEAN TO PREVENT FLOODING

When it rains, storm-water runoff flows across the ground and pavement into storm sewers where the water makes its way to streams. As storm-water runoff moves over the ground, it picks up and carries natural and manmade pollutants including: fertilizers and herbicides used on lawns, automotive fluids, improperly disposed chemicals, improperly disposed yard waste, sediment from erosion, waste from animals, and trash. The polluted runoff flows through the storm sewer underground and is released, untreated, into local waterways.

With our provided tips, you can assist in keeping these storm drains clear of hazards so they may work properly during heavy rain and keeps streams clean.

Tips for Reducing Pollutants:


- Scoop the poop! Pet waste is not a fertilizer.
- Use less or no pesticides or herbicides.
- Never fertilize your yard before it rains and don't water immediately after applying.
- Never pour chemicals directly into storm drains. Dispose or recycle chemicals properly by taking them to the hazardous waste center. Visit www. hhwstl.com for more information.
- Use less salt or a salt alternative on icy sidewalks during winter.
- Repair leaky vehicles as soon as the leak is discovered.
- Wash your car at an indoor car wash.
- Properly dispose of trash before it ends up in storm drains.

Another threat related to improperly managed storm-water runoff is flooding. Often water flow is reduced or blocked when storm-water drains are clogged with leaves, grass clippings, and other improperly disposed yard waste. When storm-water drains can't do their job, areas that aren't in a

regulatory floodplain are subject to flooding.

Tips on Reducing Storm-water Flooding in Your Yard:

- Install a rain barrel to collect rainwater for watering. See www.msdprojectclear.org/customers/problems-tips/healthy-home-tips/rain-barrels/.
- Disconnect your rain gutters
 (downspouts) from impervious surfaces
 (such as driveways and sidewalks)
 and direct the flow to grassy areas or
 gardens.
- Allow a buffer of native grasses and other vegetation to grow along streams, ponds or wetlands. This not only filters pollutants, but also limits erosion.
 This is a great tip for those of you with creeks running through your backyards.
- Install water-tolerant plants and bushes in low-lying areas that tend to collect water. This vegetation will help soak up the rainfall.
- Do not sweep, rake, or blow grass clippings or leaves along the street or into a storm drain.
- Do not dump yard waste into creeks or

Taking the proper precautions can reduce the risk of flooding on your property. However, floods can happen anywhere. Most homeowner insurance policies do not cover flood damage. Flood insurance is a separate policy that is designed to cover the building, the contents within the building, or both.

Do you have large items that you're looking to get rid of this spring? The City of Maryland Heights is hosting another bulk waste collection on Saturday, April 20. Residents may stop by between 8:00 a.m. and noon to dispose items in dumpsters placed in the parking lot of Aquaport. Residents can utilize dumpsters to throw away unwanted or broken furniture, bundles of carpet (no longer than 4' in length and 3' in diameter), mattresses, and glass portion of doors/windows (broken down in a box and marked "glass"). Once dumpsters are full, no additional items will be accepted. No registration is required for this event.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS UPDATE

The following is a brief update of the current L Capital Projects as of March 1, 2024:

2024 Concrete Replacement Program

Construction is expected to begin April 1. Pavement replacement will take place in Parkland Woods and Autumn Lakes subdivisions.

Adie Road (Dorsett Rd. to Lindbergh Blvd.)

Construction is expected to begin April 1. The road is scheduled to be closed to through traffic from April 1 - mid-August. After August, the road will be open to one-way traffic going northbound. This project is scheduled to be completed by the end of October.

CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

As the weather improves, more road crews will be out on construction projects this spring and summer. In Maryland Heights, there are three main entities that maintain our roadways: MODOT (who maintain highways and other state routes), St. Louis County Transportation (who maintains several of our main roads), and the City of Maryland Heights Public Works Department (who maintains city streets). To view a map of who maintains which roads, visit www.marylandheights.com/streetmaps.

We've compiled a list of the projects that will be happening this summer, and a few that are just on the horizon in the design phase so you can stay alert, drive safely, and be updated with the most current news!

MARYLAND HEIGHTS Adie Road (Dorsett Rd. to **Lindbergh Blvd.**)

Adie Road is about to get a makeover! This project involves the reconstruction of this section of Adie with the addition of sidewalks constructed to Grand Circle Drive on the western/northern side. This will include the replacement of the box culvert, which sits under the road, during which Adie Road will be closed (April 1 - mid August) to all through traffic. After the box culvert replacement, the street will be constructed one-half mile at a time with traffic restricted to one lane from Dorsett to Lindbergh (August -October).

Construction is expected to be completed by fall 2024.

ST. LOUIS COUNTY Westport Plaza Dr./ Marine Ave.

Work continues with this resurfacing project, which is bringing



curb repairs, ADA-compliant curb ramps, sidewalk repairs, and Accessible Pedestrian Signal upgrades at traffic signals and traffic signal replacements.

Construction is expected to be completed by summer 2024.

McKelvey, Bennington, Ameling, and McKelvey Phase II

Both of these projects provide pavement resurfacing and the addition of ADA-compliant curb ramps and sidewalks. Once completed, pedestrian accessibility will be vastly improved. St. Louis County states that they are waiting for consistently warmer weather to finish the paving operations.

Construction is expected to be completed by spring 2024.

McKelvey (Creve Coeur Mill to Natural Bridge) and Creve Coeur Mill (Prichard Farm to **Interstate Dr.)**

These two resurfacing projects will include pavement resurfacing, concrete pavement repairs, curb ramps, sidewalk replacements, and traffic signal upgrades. St. Louis County will be hiring a contractor late this summer.

Construction will begin towards the end of 2024.

Prichard Farm Bridge

St. Louis County has been actively working with the levee district to coordinate mutually agreed repairs to the damage that took place in the June 2022 flooding event. They currently do not have a schedule for re-opening the road at this time.

No construction timeline has been set.

CITY TO INSPECT RESIDENTIAL **STREETS** THIS SUMMER

Beginning around the last week of May through approximately mid-July, the Department of Public Works' summer intern will be performing pavement inspections of streets maintained by the city.

This year's inspections include residential streets located generally north of Ameling Road and Midland Avenue.

The intern must be on the street within traffic lanes to count, measure, and record pavement defects. We ask all drivers to be alert and exercise caution in these areas. We may also have to stop traffic briefly to perform an inspection. Your patience and cooperation will allow the intern to perform these inspections safely.



CULTURE ON YOUR BLOCK: GRUPO FOLKLORICO PANAMEÑO

Por this edition of 'Culture on Your Block', a highlight of international culture in Maryland Heights, we'd like to introduce Ana House, a vibrant performer bringing the joy and beauty of Panama to WorldFest 2024.

Originally from Panama, Ana has been living in the United States for twenty-eight years but her roots, love, and passion for her country run deep.

In an interview for the latest episode of the MH Life Podcast, Ana was eager to share details about Panama. She is proud of the diverse population which is influenced by many nationalities: African, North American, European, American Indian, and Spanish. She noted that her most favorite dish is the Arroz Con Pollo (rice with chicken) and how she grew up with beautiful coastlines. "Panama is one place where you are able to watch the sun rise over

the Pacific and set over the Atlantic from the top of the highest point in the country, Volcán Barú," said Ana. "The Pacific side is a little colder and the Caribbean side has white sand and crystal clear waters. It's beautiful!"

Ana grew up familiar with the different regions of Panama. She spoke of the jungles near the Columbian border, the mountains, and the Volcán Barú.

"The flora and fauna are so beautiful in Panama," explained Ana. "The beauty of the nature is represented in the head pieces that we wear when we perform."

Not to be missed is the iconic Panama Canal, a source of national pride. Ana encourages everyone who visits to experience the wonder of this engineering marvel. "You are able to book tours and watch the ships raise up to pass through." She explained that it truly is a sight to see if

you get to visit Panama.

It's not just about landmarks, beautiful coastline, and cuisine. Panama's festive spirit is evident in its vibrant celebrations – like Carnival, where the entire country comes alive with music, dance, and colorful parades. This holiday is celebrated four days before Ash Wednesday. People typically take off work so they can celebrate. The streets are filled with celebrities, queens, artists, and festivities.

Ana's journey to the United States began when she met her husband who was serving in the U.S. Army while she was attending college. Despite him returning to the U.S., their connection endured. They reunited four years later. "He was so close to loosing me, and I, too, was close to loosing him," said Ana. They ultimately settled in Illinois, where they raised their family.

"My friends and I would go to these festivals to watch several other groups perform. We turned to each other and said, 'we should do this!"

As a Zumba instructor, Ana's love for dance and connecting with people shines through. It was this passion that led her and a group of friends to form a dance troupe after being inspired by the vibrant Spanish festivals in Missouri and Illinois.

"My friends and I would go to these festivals to watch several other groups perform," she said. "We turned to each other and said, 'we should do this!"

Seven years later, their group has grown and performed at various venues, spreading the joy of Panamanian culture.

While they do love to support several other Hispanic associations in the St. Louis area, Grupo Folklorico Panameño in STL is the only official Panama group in the metro area. Although, they hope to grow their presence through networking, performances, and social media.

For Ana, representing Panama isn't just about performing – it's about fostering connections and celebrating diversity. Through their performances, they hope to not only entertain but also educate and inspire others to appreciate the beauty of Panama and its people.

BLACK HISTORY IN MARYLAND HEIGHTS

Aryland Heights has stood as both a thriving community of diversity and a destination for entertainment in the St. Louis region, long before it was an incorporated city. It is clear, as we look back, that our community has a rich history as a welcoming place for all to gather, connect, and express cultures and religion. This identity was built long ago and remains as the unifying heartbeat of our City today.

Bolton's Oak Grove and Musick Baptist Church are two prominent historic sites that each provided space for Black locals to build community. Whether it was for a few decades or centuries, these sites have seen much of our region's history unfold.

"What has been uncovered by us pales in comparison to the potential impact it has on those who love to learn history, particularly in the place they call home," said James Surgeon, City Council Member, Ward 1. "A Black man [Bolton] had the vision, but this and all other history is too rich to be regulated to one month out of the year."

We hope that this quick glimpse towards the past gives you a deeper appreciation for your City's history and ignites a passion for its future.

BOLTON'S OAK GROVE

Owned by well-known businessman and coal merchant, A.J. Bolton, Bolton's Oak Grove was a multipurpose, private park that opened in 1940. The parks spanned 25 acres southeast of Dorsett Rd. and Fee Fee Creek, near the present day Government Center.

"The site is a true grove, well-shaded and sloped," said Ina McFadden in a July 1940 opinion column of the *St. Louis Argus* newspaper.

In a time when much of the St. Louis area was still segregated, Bolton's Grove served as a highly-desired destination away from the city for the Black community to enjoy the outdoors and host events.

Bolton's Grove was only a 20 minute drive from the City. The space featured



a five-acre baseball diamond, a dance pavilion, an orchestra stand, badminton and tennis courts, a swimming pool, horseback riding, carnival rides and food vendors. It welcomed reservations for all occasions—private parties, public and private picnics, banquets, weddings, and political functions.

Bolton's Oak Grove became quite the hot spot for live music, welcoming popular musicians such as William "Count" Basie, Chuck Berry, Ike and Tina Turner, "Little Milton" Campbell, B.B. King, and Little Willie John. Cars would line Dorsett Rd. for over a mile, with attendees eager to see the renowned performers.

"It was the only place in St. Louis
County where Black people could come to
be entertained, and they brought [artists]
in from all over...," said James "Jim" Dean
Sanders in the 2010 edition of *The History*of Maryland Heights by Paul H. Thompson.
"In the summertime on Friday and Saturday
Nights, that place was something because it
would be so busy. I used to sit on the bridge
and listen to those musicians all night long.
You could hear it all over town."

MUSICK BAPTIST CHURCH

Established decades before the Civil War in 1811, Musick Baptist Church began as a congregation of enslaved people.

According to oral tradition, Rev. Thomas Musick, plantation owner and founder of Fee Fee Baptist Church, was touched by the religious singing of his slaves. This moved him to gift a parcel of land for the slaves to build a church of their own at the southern end of the plantation.

There, they built a log cabin in the spot still occupied by Musick Baptist Church and its cemetery two centuries later. With this, Musick Baptist has been noted by historians as the oldest Black church west of the Mississippi River.

"The church's cemetery contains scattered graves, most of them unmarked, undoubtedly containing many remains of enslaved people," said Julie D. Nicolai in her book, title *Enslavement and the Underground Rail Road in Missouri and Illinois*.

Through most of its 213 years of existence, Musick Baptist Church served as one of the few churches where Black people in the area could worship. The congregation, to this day, is still an active community, welcoming members and visitors through its vibrant red doors.

Each year on its anniversary, the church receives a proclamation from the Mayor of Maryland Heights, declaring October 8 Music Baptist Church Day.





SENIORS ENJOY A ST. PATTY'S LUNCH

An annual tradition that has lasted over three decades, our St. Patrick's Day senior luncheon is a City of Maryland Heights signature event. Every year, our residents show up with empty bellies and decked out in green for a special corned beef and cabbage meal served by the Mayor, Council members, City staff, Pattonville High School students, and committee volunteers.



SOLAR CANOPIES UPDATE

Happy one year anniversary to the Maryland Heights solar canopies! This structure completed installation in April of 2023 as a part of Ameren's Neighborhood Solar program. This program was established to help our area establish and expand renewable energy generation in underutilized locations. These sites provide clean energy to the grid and serve as a hub of renewable workforce development and solar education across Ameren's service area.

"We applied for the program because we saw the opportunity to further our stance on cleaner ways to obtain energy," states Charlie Milligan, Superintendent of Parks. "We had a whole parking lot that was underutilized and now it is collecting clean energy to go back directly into our grid to serve our community."

The Maryland Heights location, the Fee Fee Renewable Energy Center, can be seen

from Highway 270 and sits between the Maryland Heights Community Center and Aquaport. The canopies contain 1,335 solar modules and provide shade to Aquaport patrons in the summertime.

Data shows that on average, the Fee Fee Renewable Energy Center produces enough energy to provide electrical needs of sixty homes per year. From April 2023 to February 2024, this location has generated a total of 590,394 kWh.

"The solar canopies are a physical display of Maryland Heights' commitment to a sustainable future," said Economic Development Director Jim Carver. "We were very happy with the collaboration with Ameren for this project and are pleased to see the interest it has sparked from other cities. We are proud to lead the way to a cleaner future."



SPRINGTIME BIKE TUNEUPS WITH THE MARYLAND HEIGHTS FIRE DISTRICT

The Maryland Heights Fire District's Community Outreach spring bike tune-up program returns for its second year in 2024.

Have a child's bike that need some TLC? Fire district residents are invited to the fire house this spring for tune ups on bikes 20 inches or smaller.

Tune ups will include

- Flat tire repair
- Broken chain repair
- Chain lubrication
- Brakes repairs
- Bolts and screw tightening

Got a new bike that needs assembly? They can help with that too!

The bike tune-up program began in 2023 as an outreach idea proposed by firefighter and paramedic Jacob Cantrell. Between his interest in mechanics and


extensive experience with bikes at a previous fire district, Cantrell and the Community Outreach thought it would be a good idea to offer bike servicing to the families of Maryland Heights.
